Over 150 Years ago, 300 women and men gathered in Seneca Falls, New York, at the First Women's Rights Convention to demand greater equality for women.



The Elizabeth Cady Stanton Trust owns one of the largest collections of ephemera on women's suffrage and political rights.

Beyond Suffrage-Onward! Family Leave Act

Union Calendar No. 468

96TH CONGRESS H. R. 4300

Report No. 99-699, Parts I and II]

To entitle employees to percental leave in mass involving the hirth, adoption, or serious health condition of a sen or daughter and temporary medical leave in eases involving inability to work because of a serious health condition, with adequate protection of the employees' employment and benefit rights, and to establish a commission to study ways of providing salary replacement for employees who take any such leave.





Yes, we made progress, but much remains undone

- Women make up three-fifths of all adults living in poverty
- Women are less than half as likely as men to receive a pension, and those who do receive one get half as much
- Women constitute two-thirds of all minimum wage workers
- · Women earn 74 cents on the dollar paid to men
- Domestic violence is the leading cause of death for women ages 14-44 worldwide
- 30 percent of visits by women to emergency rooms are due to physical violence by their partners.
